1. Social areas and support hubs

- Dining and barbeque areas
- Both covered and open seating areas
- Benches and seating furniture
- Lunch areas
- Restrooms
- Changing facilities

- Storage options and secure lockers

- A communal gathering spot connecting the sports park and the multi-purpose hall

2. Safety and security in the sports park

- A safe space for young people in the park

- A communal "garden" with space for spontaneous activities and play

4. Facilities and activities

Facilities:

- Running track
- Outdoor fitness equipment
- Multi-purpose court for football, basketball, etc.
- Sand area for beach volleyball and general beach sports
- Tennis court
- Cricket facilities
- Artificial turf
- Street sports: basketball, skating, and street-style areas
- Small pump tracks and mountain biking
- Small athletics facilities
- Stage

- Outdoor climbing facility
- Space for self-organized physical activity
- A space for experimenting with and testing activities

Activities:

- Yoga
- Disc golf
- Parkour
- Water activities for young children
- Scouts activity
- Birdwatching tours
- Outdoor activities
- Athletics
- Focus on low-intensity forms of exercise, e.g., walking clubs

5. Events in the parken

- Flea market
- Bazaar
- Street food
- The sports park must be able to accommodate large local events, such as the Tingbjerg Challenge.

6. Parking

- Multi-functional parking areas: parking zones can serve different purposes— e.g., street basketball on weekdays and parking on weekends or during major events.
- Focus on bicycle parking - including spaces for cargo bikes
